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Communities of Color Unite to Celebrate Nature and Arts with MassQ Ball

Boston, MA - Co-producers Castle of our Skins, The Arnold Arboretum of Harvard University, and visual artist Daniel Callahan of Create & Record, team up to present MassQ Ball 2022: Origin, a large-scale celebration grounded in ritual, performance and cross-cultural arts that asks the question: "If we, together, could author our own creation story, what would we create?" Held on Saturday, July 9th at the Arnold Arboretum, the event will feature the diverse artistic expressions of and for Boston's communities of color.

In conjunction with major anniversaries - Castle of our Skins' 10th and The Arnold Arboretum's 150th - the MassQ Ball will be a co-created space for connection and healing collaboratively envisioned with multimedia artist and designer Daniel Callahan. "I am passionate about revealing connections between cultures, peoples, and ideas through the platforms of entertainment, fine art, education, and cultural activism," Daniel Callahan relays.

"Very much central to our work is the idea of celebration, being proud of where we come from, being proud of who we are, and being proud of the collective energy and excellence that we, as people of color have," **Ashleigh Gordon**, Violist, Executive and Artistic Director of **Castle of our Skins**, said. "The **MassQ Ball** is a showcase of all sorts of artistic disciplines from different communities of color that collaboratively work together to create something new."

"For 150 years, the Arnold Arboretum landscape has provided a free and open environment to connect the diverse people of Boston to the wonders and restorative power of nature," said Arboretum Director **William (Ned) Friedman**. "We are thrilled to collaborate with Castle of our Skins and remarkable artists like **Daniel Callahan** to craft unique experiences that make the Arboretum more welcoming and inspiring for everyone."

The MassQ Ball 2022: Origin will be preceded by a six-part series of lectures, panels, and interactive workshops designed to deepen attendee's collective understanding. All events will be either in-person at The Arnold Arboretum or live-streamed, free with advanced registration, and open to all ages, cultures, and communities. The precursor events will begin with a live-streamed panel on identity, culture, and the arts on Saturday, March 26, 2022, from 1:00 p.m. - 2:30 p.m. The panel will feature visual activist **L'Merchie Frazier**, dancer **Jenny Oliver**, and restauranteur **Biplaw Rai.** *Identity* | *Culture* | *Arts* will explore the deeply intertwined relationship between identity, artistic expression, and how both can be leveraged for cross-cultural connectivity.



On Saturday, April 30, 2022 from 1:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m., *Soul: An Ancestor Workshop* will be led by poet and **Castle of our Skins' Shirley Graham Du Bois** Creative in Residence **Marlanda Dekine**. The participatory workshop will use writing and meditation to consider how our individual origin stories and ancestries influence our being.

Dr. Liseli A. Fitzpatrick, a Trinidadian-scholar in the field of African Diasporic cosmologies and sacred ontologies, will lead an engaging lecture and discussion exploring African mythologies and folkloric cultures on Saturday, May 14, 2022 from 1:00 p.m. – 2:00 p.m. On Saturday, May 21, 2022, from 3:00 p.m. - 4:30 p.m., **Castle of our Skins'** Director of Education, **Taylor Lena McTootle**, will lead the *Making a Mythos* workshop focused on the creative power of storytelling. Young participants, ages 8-12, will experience firsthand how fictional tales can reflect our cultural values and create them.

On Saturday, June 4, 2022, **Daniel Callahan** will lead a *MassQing Workshop* from 1:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m. Participants will learn the origin, technique, and meaning behind Daniel's artistic practice of MassQing, which uses the human face as a canvas to reveal one's inner state to create their own MassQ.

On Saturday, June 25, 2022, Bengali culture worker Pampi will lead a *Making of Ceremonial Vessels Workshop*. Attendees will weave love letters to their loved ones into hand-crafted ceremonial vessels. The vessels will be fashioned out of natural materials sourced from the grounds of the Arboretum and displayed in the **MassQ Ball** July 9th event.
